The 2020 Town & County tax bills were mailed out on 12/31/19. If you did not receive your paper bill in the mail in the beginning of January and your taxes are not in escrow thru a mortgage company, please remember that you are still responsible for the timely payment of these annual taxes.

I do my best to track down any new owner(s) addresses from recently sold parcels and any property owners whose bills are returned to me by the post office due to a problem with the mailing address but please remember that it is your responsibility to make sure that my office and the office of the Assessor has your correct, current mailing address. 2020 Town Clean Up Day

Please be advised that the 2020 Clean Up Day will be held on May 16, 2020 from 8:00 am – 2:00 pm, rain or shine. For those of you who are not familiar with Clean Up Day, this is a one day event held annually by the Town for its residents where we provide access to trash dumpsters also known as roll-offs for your personal use. The roll-offs (dumpsters/bins) are set up in the Town Hall parking lot in the space between the Highway Garage and the basketball courts and behind the Highway Garage. The fee for this service is a punch card and a non-perishable food donation to Charlie's Pantry which can be dropped off at the Town Hall when you pick up your punch card WHICH ARE NOW AVAILABLE AT TOWN HALL. Please be mindful of the expiration dates on your donated food as expired food cannot be accepted. There is a list of items that are prohibited from being accepted into the dumpsters that can be found <http://townofnewlebanon.com/town-clean-up-day-faq/> This list can also be found in hard copy format in the Town Clerk's Office, as well as on the community bulletin board in the main hallway at town hall.

This event is a structured event, meaning that you don't just pull up and off-load into a dumpster. There are separate dumpsters/bins for different categories of items and the day is operated by a great group of volunteers who will be assisting you in off-loading your vehicles, which helps keeps the line moving. For this reason, it is a great idea to keep tires (cannot be over 24 inches) at the top of your pile so that they can easily be off-loaded and rolled to their designated dumpster while you are waiting in line to off-load the rest. It is also a good idea to separate metal and appliances toward the back or bottom of your pile as there are designated bins for those items as well.

We are always very grateful for the generous folks who donate their time and muscle, especially on a Saturday, to be a part of the off-loading crew. They are fabulous to work with and actually make 'trash day' a fun day. If you are interested in volunteering, we would be happy to add you to the crew; simply call our office at (518) 794-8884 to request to be placed on our list. For residents with physical/medical challenges who may need assistance getting their items loaded and/ or transported to town hall, please call us well in advance of the event so that we have ample time to try to find an available volunteer(s) with a large enough vehicle and who is physically able to assist you.

We wish to give special recognition to Jeff Winestock, Highway Superintendent, for collaborating with the Building Department to make this event possible each year. We thank him not only for his time, staff and equipment on the day of the event but for all of the clean up, black top repairs and follow up for days after the event. We look forward to seeing you in the Spring!

From The Town Historian

Elizabeth Sheffer-Winig has set up the office of Town Historian in the New Lebanon Town Hall. Elizabeth's background includes 24 years of teaching social studies, English, special education, and family and consumer sciences in the Berlin, Berkshire Farm, and New Lebanon School Districts. For 20 years she worked for New York State United Teachers, (NYSUT) in the Research and Educational Services Department. During her tenure at NYSUT, Elizabeth worked with the NYS Education Department in the development of standards and assessments and with NYS teachers in writing curriculum and units aligned to the standards and with the FDR Presidential Library and Museum and the RFK Center for Justice and Human Rights.

Ms. Sheffer-Winig has an active role in community life. She wrote the application for placing the Lebanon Springs Union Free School on the NYS and National Historic Registry and conducted research with students on the Union Free School and seven NYS historic markers in the town. Elizabeth served as a board member and president of the Lebanon Valley Historical Society. Currently, Elizabeth serves as Senior Warden at the Church of Our Savior. After a wonderful 12 years serving the New Lebanon Central School District as Principal of both the Junior/Senior High School and Walter B. Howard Elementary School, and the last five as Superintendent of Schools, I have made the difficult decision to retire from public education effective at the end of September 2020.

To ensure a seamless transition, the Board of Education has approved a succession plan that will see WBH Principal Mr. Andrew Kourt become Superintendent of Schools on October 1, 2020. I congratulate him and I thank the Board for their efforts to make sure that this wonderful school district will have the leadership necessary to continue on its trajectory of success and responsible stewardship of this community's most valuable resource, its children.

New Lebanon CSD Capital Project Update

New Lebanon Central School District voters approved a \$11,855,000 capital project in May 2017 to make several needed improvements and updates at both Walter B. Howard Elementary School and the Junior/Senior High School. Work began in the summer of 2018 and is scheduled to be completed by the end of September 2020.

Currently, crews are working to replace doors, door frames and hardware and renovate bathrooms in both schools. The Jr/Sr High School fire alarm system has been upgraded and that work is now underway at Walter B. Howard Elementary School. At the Jr/Sr High School, flooring is being replaced, the business classroom has been renovated, and we are about to begin renovations of the locker room. Additionally, the maintenance building on the Jr/Sr High School campus has been replaced.

The District has also engaged in an Energy Performance Contract which has resulted in new lighting and other energy conservations measures at both schools. This project will conclude this summer with replacement of a boiler, renovation of a second boiler and conversion of the heating system to propane.

This summer, WBH will see the addition of a new secured entrance and reconstructed main office, a gymnasium addition and renovation of the kitchen. The high school kitchen will be fitted with new equipment and a new serving line. There will also be an improvement to the pool viewing area. .

Columbia County Is A CodeRED Community

What is CodeRED?

The CodeRED Emergency Notification System is a fast communication service allowing Columbia County to notify citizens of an emergency situation. It enables County emergency services to provide mass notification quickly and easily. This service is free to all Columbia County residents and businesses.

How will I benefit from this service?

This high-speed telephone system will allow Columbia County emergency services to contact participants to provide information about critical situations, what action needs to be taken, and notification that the situation has been resolved.

What do I have to do to receive this benefit?

To receive CodeRED and Weather Warning Calls, you must register your home, cell phone, or business phone number in the CodeRED database. If you would like to join the Weather Warning program make sure to check the Weather Warning Box on the Registration Form before you submit.

How does it work?

CodeRED delivers the important message through a high-speed telephone calling system to a phone number on the CodeRED database. Emergency Services will access CodeRED via a secure portal on the web. A "call area" will be marked identifying street addresses. Telephone numbers will be matched up electronically to these addresses through the use of Geographical Information Systems (GIS). A pre-recorded message will be sent out via the telephone with information about the incident and possibly instructions for action to be taken.

What should I do if I receive a CodeRED message?

Listen carefully.

Follow instructions.

Don't hang up until you hear the whole message. (the message will not be repeated)

DO NOT call 9-1-1 unless instructed to do so! (you will only tie up emergency lines)

What should I do if I don't receive a message?

Your area of the community may not be affected. In which case, you won't receive a call even if it's only a block away.

Will the system work with cell phones?

Yes. But, you must register your cell phone number with CodeRED.

Columbia County Is A CodeRED Community (Continued)

What is CodeRED used for?

CodeRED will be used for significant incidents and events where the timely notification of an affected population or geographic area is essential.

Why did CodeRED call me several times?

If there is no answer and you do not have an answering device, the number will be attempted up to 3 times.

Why did I get a call, but no message played?

If you answer and do not say hello, CodeRED will not begin playing automatically. It is trying to determine if it has reached a live person or answering device. If you don't say anything, it will hang up and retry the number in the next pass of the non connected numbers.

Why did it leave only part of the message on my answering machine?

CodeRED will leave a message on an answering device. There are many different brands and types of capturing devices for leaving a message. Occasionally something about the answering device or the beep of the device causes the system to think it has reached a live person and begins playing the message. When the message is left, it only leaves part of the message. They can call back the 866-419-5000 and receive the entire message. This does not happen often.

How Do I Register?

To register for CodeRED alerts, go to the [CodeRED registration page](#) and complete the Community Notification Enrollment form. After creating a profile, you will be able to add phone numbers and email addresses that you would like to receive alerts on. You can also opt-in or out of the Severe Weather notifications. If you don't have access to the Internet, please call the Columbia County 911 Office at 518-828-1263, or the Columbia County Emergency Management Office at 518-828-1212 for assistance.
