#### From the Office of the Town Clerk

New Year, new recycling permit. Did you know that as of January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023 you need to purchase a new recycling permit? If you have not already done so, you can purchase your permit at the New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office during open office hours (Mon, Wed, Thurs & Fri from 9-5) (CLOSED ON TUES). The annual fee is \$50.00 a year for County residents, \$35.00 a year for our County resident seniors over 65 years of age and \$100.00 for out of County residents.

The Town Clerk's office also sells the garbage tags for the transfer station. They come in sheets of five, \$3.00 tags are good for garbage bags up to about 30gal. and \$5.00 tags are good for garbage bags up to about 55gal.

#### The Next KISS Program at the Town Hall

The Columbia County KISS Program is once again available to seniors in every town in Columbia County. The KISS Program, founded by Columbia County Clerk Holly Tanner, stands for Keeping the Identities of Seniors Safe. It was designed to protect the identities of our seniors while assisting them in the shredding of their sensitive materials. #### NL Receives \$20,000 NY Main St. Planning Grant

The Town of New Lebanon has been awarded a \$20,000 NY Main Street Technical Assistance Grant for a Design Guidelines Technical Assistance Project. This is phase 1 of a 2 phase grant program. Phase 1 provides funding to create design guidelines for beautifying our downtown business district through phase 2 funding. Once the design guidelines are created and adopted by the Town Board, we will apply for phase 2 funding which provides direct funding to businesses on the Route 20/22 corridor to do external upgrades such as siding, windows, signage, landscaping, etc. with the focus on beautifying our downtown business district. Property owners in the downtown business district who choose to participate in phase 2 will receive \$0.75 on every dollar invested in external upgrades that qualify under the program.

- The Reassessment for 2023 is postponed until 2024. However, there will be an overall increase to the assessments for 2023 in an effort to maintain our current level of 90%. Notices of changes will be mailed May 1st.

## HEAP Is Still Open for Enrollment

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) for the 2022-23 season is still accepting applications. You can pick up an application at the New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office. If you received a regular benefit last year and are over 60 years old, you should have already received your application. If you are receiving food stamps, you are automatically enrolled in HEAP.

If you would like to apply for HEAP and did not receive it last year, you must have an interview and may opt for an in person or phone interview. To qualify for HEAP you must make under \$2,852 per month gross for a household of 1, under \$3,730 per month gross for a household of 2, under \$4,608 per month gross for a household of 3, under \$5,485 per month gross for a household of 4 and under \$6,363 for a household of 5. New applicants must have proof of each household member's identity, proof of applicant's social security number and for each household

member, proof of residence, proof of fuel and/or utility bill if you pay for heat or proof that you pay rent which includes heat, and proof of income for all household members. If you need assistance applying you can contact Columbia Opportunities (if under 60 years old) at 518-828-4611 or Office for the Aging (if over 60 years old) at 518-828-4258. You can also contact the Department of Social Services at 518-828-9411 with any questions. You can also apply online at <u>www.mybenefits.ny.gov</u>. For more information about HEAP go to <u>http://www.ny.gov/services/apply-heap</u>.

If you are eligible for HEAP, you may also be eligible for the Columbia Opportunities Inc. Weatherization Program. COI provides energy audits to eligible homeowners and renters to find the best way to make their homes more energy efficient. Weatherization measures - such as furnace repair or replacement, wall and attic insulation, air sealing, energy efficient refrigerators - are installed to make residences safe, comfortable and less expensive to heat. Most people see a 20% reduction in their home heating bills after the weatherization work is done! Please call 518-828-4611 or 518-672-7268 for more information and an application. #### News From The New Lebanon Conservation Advisory Council (CAC)

Please join us in thanking David Farren who retired December 31, 2022 after ten years of service to the CAC. His decade on the committee saw the growth of the CAC and many goals were achieved in that time, including the publication of Natural Resource Conservation Plan, numerous grants for the CAC and other town projects, DEC Trees for Tribs projects, and the creation of several Critical Environmental Areas.

As evidenced by the results of a town-wide poll last year, our natural resources, underground water sources, forests, streams and rivers and the overall beauty of where we live is of great importance to everyone who lives here, and the CAC continues to preserve and protect and honor our land. Among many projects we are working on in 2023 is our continuing to look at water health in town. The CAC just received the final copy of the New Lebanon Source Water Protection Plan – it has been sent to the Town Board for approval and then the state will need to approve the document. This plan, created for New Lebanon by Steve Winkley of the NY Rural Water Association, gives us a complete guide to how to protect all of our water sources and will be made available to the public after the State approves it. One of our 2023 goals is to create a Critical Environmental Area designating our main aquifer as a location to be sure to protect and preserve.

The CAC is helping the Town with water studies and we are partnering with the Business and Economic Development Committee on the Waste Water Study Committee. Part of our Waste Water work, among other things, will be offering free water testing to residents around town who will share their results with us – and the Waste Water Committee will be looking to test along the Rte 20/22 corridor where wastewater is being studied in particular. Please reach out to us if you are having concerns over your well water and any other water concerns and we will be happy to talk to you and share our plans and see if you are in our areas of interest. Much more will be shared on this soon as well. The Waste Water Committee consists of Josh Young, Deb Gordon, and Peg Munves – and we have been working with Candace Balmer of RCAP Solutions on how to apply for a grant for the Waste Water Study. Nineteen businesses and property owners along the Rte 20/22 corridor would like to see the wastewater study done and we hope to complete this by mid-year so we have much more information on its feasibility. ### Update From The NL Climate Smart Communities Task Force (CSC)

Silver is on the minds of members of New Lebanon's Climate Smart Communities Task Force this winter: Silver Certification from the NY State Climate Smart Communities Program. Just as it did in order to earn Bronze Certification, the town must complete a series of actions that curb climate change and/or help residents adapt to its effects. The variety and extent of projects that members of the Task Force are taking on — from running repair cafes to fixing bikes — puts the town close to earning the Silver this year, Only 5 towns in NY State, all considerably larger than New Lebanon, have earned it so far.

With grants already earned for installing heat pumps in Town Hall and other actions, the Task Force will provide for the installation of solar panels on the Town Hall roof. This action also brings the town closer to Silver Certification, which brings more grants. In addition, the town will profit for years from the resulting decrease in heating and lighting bills.

Another major project is a town-wide food scrap collection program. A partial, preliminary survey about residents' interest in this idea, conducted at Shaker Village in West Lebanon, was overwhelmingly positive. Over half of the respondents volunteered to help monitor the collection buckets.

History Happenings – From the Town Historian

Update on the Revolutionary War Veterans in Cypress Hill Cemetery Project

"Born a British citizen; Died an American Patriot"

Engraved on a Revolutionary War veteran's stone

Who is here?

Veterans from the Creek Indian Wars, the Revolution, War of 1812, and the Civil War call Cypress Hill their final resting place. US Congressman John King's marker is also in need of TLC. Help find these stones! Over 200 cemetery stones are located on this hill. Let's show our veterans the respect they earned.

## History Happenings – From the Town Historian (Continued)

What has been overlooked until recent years has been the oldest section of the Cemetery of the Evergreens, Cypress Hill, which is where the earliest burials including, perhaps, three dozen Revolutionary War veterans are located. About a decade ago, they were largely unknown, until thentown-historian Sharon Moon started investigating. What she found was a long-overgrown, poison-ivyinfested hilltop. She set to work to minimize the poison ivy and to find and preliminarily mark graves from two centuries ago. She researched existing documentation indicating veteran burials. Now, the poison ivy has receded significantly, and the vegetation has been reduced to manageable levels.

So began a new consortium of workers, in identifying and honoring these veterans, many of whom helped establish the town over 200 years ago. This group includes the Hendrick Hudson Chapter NSDAR, the Cemetery of the Evergreens, George Clark, veteran and member of the Floyd Carleton American Legion Post, the Town of New Lebanon, the Lebanon Valley Historical Society, and Moon. It's a continuation of an earlier effort that also included Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and the New Lebanon Central School District. It may well engage them again.

After meeting with community and DAR members, it was agreed to apply for a DAR historic restoration grant of identified Revolutionary War veterans. Current New Lebanon Town Historian Elizabeth Sheffer-Winig, who is also a Hendrick Hudson DAR Chapter member, said the project will "identify, catalog, and honor those who served in the American Revolution. We intend to restore the stones, research the lives and military service of the patriots buried there, and produce a booklet about them. The project's culmination will be a grave-marking ceremony by the Hendrick Hudson Chapter that will honor each patriot."

Hendrick Hudson Chapter Historian Doris Harrington said "Placing veterans' markers is a tangible way for our chapter and the town to honor and connect with Revolutionary War veterans, and maybe even some descendants. The markers will highlight and publicize the life and service of these patriots, some of whom are listed in the NSDAR's extensive genealogy. They will become part of the legacy of the Revolutionary War, and we will archive their information in our chapter's genealogical and historical library."

An important milestone arrives in 2026 which will celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. Immediate Past Chapter Regent Jeane LaPorta said, "Completing this project in advance of 250-year celebrations will be gratifying to many. The DAR's goals are historic preservation, education, and patriotism. With this effort we refuse to let slip into the dustbins of time the heroic deeds of veterans. As importantly, we are Daughters of the American Revolution, and as such we feel strongly about the heroic and substantial efforts by the women of that day, whether they be veterans themselves or the mothers, wives, daughters, or siblings of veterans. Without their contributions, the War for Independence surely would have failed. Keeping memories alive and honoring the foundational struggles of men and women is vitally important." The current Chapter Regent Virginia Martin, is enthusiastic for the project and looks forward to the Chapter's part in the project. Christopher White of Albany Grave Digger Genealogical Services and Gravestone Restoration will be retained by the Hendrick Hudson Chapter and the board of the Cemetery of the Evergreens oversee the restoration process.

## History Happenings – From the Town Historian (Continued)

The Hendrick Hudson Chapter of the DAR was chartered in 1896. A nonpartisan organization welcoming eligible women without regard to race, creed, or religion, it includes 130 members who trace their lineage back to a patriot in the American Revolution–whether serving as soldier, shopkeeper, or seamstress. In accordance with the National Society DAR, members work to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the women and men who achieved American independence, to promote the development of an enlightened public opinion, and to foster patriotic citizenship. The chapter owns and maintains its meeting house, the Historic Robert Jenkins House, at 113 Warren Street in Hudson. The chapter and the chapter house can be <u>accessed online</u>, by emailing <u>hendrickhudsonchapterdar@gmail.com</u>, and by calling (518) 828-9764.

The grant application will be submitted this year, 2023. The group of dedicated workers will be seeking matching funds which will make the work sustainable. The group will be meeting to develop of plan of fundraising.
