New Year, new recycling permit. Did you know that as of January 1st, 2024 you need to purchase a new recycling permit? If you have not already done so, you can purchase your permit at the New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office during open office hours (Mon, Wed, Thurs & Fri from 9-5) (CLOSED ON TUES). The annual fee is \$75.00 a year for County residents, \$50.00 a year for our County resident seniors over 65 years of age and \$125.00 for out of County residents.

The Town Clerk's office also sells the garbage bags for the transfer station. They come in packages of five, small, (7gal.) \$5.00; medium, (30gal.) \$15.00; and large, (40gal.) \$25.00.

The Next KISS Program at the Town Hall

The Columbia County KISS Program is once again available to seniors in every town in Columbia County. The KISS Program, founded by Columbia County Clerk Holly Tanner, stands for Keeping the Identities of Seniors Safe. It was designed to protect the identities of our seniors while assisting them in the shredding of their sensitive materials. Seniors are encouraged to contact their local Town Hall for more information on the program. Broadband Update

New Lebanon partnered with the Towns of Ghent, Canaan and Austerlitz to apply for a Congressional earmark from former Congressman Delgado and the project was awarded the funding in March of 2022. Since then we have been working with the 4 Towns and the CEDC to process the funding through the USDA. Though we have hit many hiccups along the way, we are in the homestretch. We are hoping to have final approval and broadband being connected to every road in New Lebanon by this Spring. If you are currently unable to connect to broadband at your house, it is coming soon! In total this funding will connect over 40 homes in New Lebanon to broadband who currently do not have access. When the project is complete, every single home in New Lebanon will have access to broadband! A huge thank you to Dave Berman from Ghent and Mike Tucker from the Columbia Economic Development Corporation (CEDC) who have been working tirelessly on this project to ensure broadband for all in our Town!

Update on the Non-Profit Pharmacy Coming to New Lebanon

The Pharmacy for the Public Good has chosen New Lebanon as the next location for their non-profit pharmacy. After running a successful for profit pharmacy in Tannersville, NY called Wellness RX, the pharmacist Ed Ullman and his team embarked on a mission to bring the first non-profit pharmacy in the nation to Phoenicia, NY. They are now ready to open their 3rd pharmacy and their 2nd non-profit pharmacy and have chosen to open it in our town! They have signed a 5 year lease in the Tilden Plaza next to Filli's. The town is working now with the pharmacy on trying to obtain state and federal funding to cover the start-up costs of the non-profit pharmacy. After successful meetings with Congressman Molinaro, Senator Hinchey and Assemblymember Barrett, the pharmacy staff is hard at work itemizing their budget and preparing the documents needed to apply for these state and federal funds. The pharmacy will serve as a wellness center for our community with a full service pharmacy as well as access to mental health care, addiction services, massage and acupuncture, and so much more! Stay tuned for updates as we help this exciting project come to fruition in New Lebanon!

Exciting Happenings in Shatford Park

The Town has been awarded a \$500,000 park grant for a new walking trail system and accessible for all playground in Shatford Park from the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation (NYS OPRHP). The walking trail portion of the project is ready to go as the town already went out to bid and accepted a bid from Darcy Construction pending being awarded the grant funding. They will be busy working on the trails this winter. The playground portion of the project is still in its design phase and we have formed a group of community members to work with the engineer and to help decide what features we want the playground to have. A new road around the tennis courts has also been installed. This was part of the master park plan to improve traffic flow and increase parking and was approved by the Town Board in 2023 as an addendum to the skatepark slab project. There are now ample parking spots next to the tennis courts for people to park and play tennis and/or pickleball!

The Town Board has budgeted to renovate the bathrooms by the tennis courts, renovate the existing water feature in the park and add a roof to the large BBQ pit by the pavilion. These projects will be going out to bid and completed in 2024.

HEAP Is Still Open for Enrollment

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) for the 2023-24 season is still accepting applications. You can pick up an application at the New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office. If you received a regular benefit last year and are over 60 years old, you should have already received your application. If you are receiving food stamps, you are automatically enrolled in HEAP.

If you would like to apply for HEAP and did not receive it last year, you must have an interview and may opt for an in person or phone interview. To qualify for HEAP you must make under \$3,035 per month gross for a household of 1, under \$3,970 per month gross for a household of 2, under \$4,904 per month gross for a household of 3, under \$5,838 per month gross for a household of 4 and under \$6,772 for a household of 5. New applicants must have proof of each household member's identity, proof of applicant's social security number and for each household member, proof of residence, proof of fuel and/or utility bill if you pay for heat or proof that you pay rent which includes heat, and proof of income for all household members. If you need assistance applying you can contact Columbia Opportunities (if under 60 years old) at 518-828-4611 or Office for the Aging (if over 60 years old) at 518-828-4258. You can also contact the Department of Social Services at 518-828-9411 with any questions. You can also apply online at www.my.gov/services/apply-heap.

If you are eligible for HEAP, you may also be eligible for the Columbia Opportunities Inc. Weatherization Program. COI provides energy audits to eligible homeowners and renters to find the best way to make their homes more energy efficient. Weatherization measures - such as furnace repair or replacement, wall and attic insulation, air sealing, energy efficient refrigerators - are installed to make residences safe, comfortable and less expensive to heat. Most people see a 20% reduction in their home heating bills after the weatherization work is done! Please call 518-828-4611 or 518-672-7268 for more information and an application. Learn about Regenerate NY: Funding For Private Landowners to Grow Forests of the Future



Presented by the New Lebanon Conservation Advisory Council and New York State Department of Environmental Conservation

Anyone with 5 acres of land or more is welcome to attend this presentation with the New Lebanon CAC and DEC's Forester Tyler Levy. We will learn about Regenerate NY.

Young forests in New York face many challenges today that did not exist a century ago, the most significant being wide-spread damage caused by increased white- tailed deer populations and competition from invasive vegetation. The purpose of this grant program is to support the regeneration of forests so they may continue to deliver vital services such as mitigating climate change, protecting air and water quality, supporting the economy and habitat to native plant and animal species. Active management of the land is essential.

Tyler will discuss the program, eligibility, awards, reimbursement, application process, match requirements and answer all of your questions.

News From The NL Climate Smart Communities Task Force (CSC)

The CSC submitted the final docs to the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation for Silver designation in the Climate Smart program on Jan 5. If approved, we will be notified around Feb 23. Achieving Silver will also get us 1400 points in NYSERDA's Clean Energy Communities (CEC) partner program. The CEC program has recently been revised to allow towns to get more points for other energy-saving actions already performed including the solar panels on Town Hall. So, after achieving Silver we will have enough points to get a \$175,000 grant for energy upgrades on the town buildings. And, if we use that grant money strategically, we can put ourselves in line for the next level which is a \$250,000 grant. Thanks to Cornell grads Michelle Parks, Alejandra Limon and Marc Anthonisen for their help getting us to Silver!

Members of the Climate Smart Communities Taskforce continue to look for ways to improve both our daily lives and our environment by making small changes in our use of resources.

On January 6, Frieda Pearce made a Zoom presentation, hosted by the New Lebanon library, to inform residents about energy-efficient options when buying refrigerators, washing machines, and dishwashers. She also discussed the pros and cons of induction vs. gas cooking, noting NYS recommendations about the harmful effects of the use of gas for home cooking.

The subcommittee on composting is extending its reach. While continuing to collect coffee grounds and egg shells from Maverick's, volunteers will provide a bucket for food scrap collection at the New Lebanon recycling center (located by the county highway garage behind the Gallup Inn). Beginning January 26, residents can bring their food scraps there on Wednesday and Saturday mornings until 11:45. This kitchen waste will be transported to Greenport, where an "EcoRich in Vessel composter", recycles food waste on site, without odors or pest problems, thereby reducing our dependency on landfills. Meat and dairy can be included among these food scraps. HOWEVER, coffee filters, paper or plastic products, "recyclable" plastic bags, yard waste are NOT to be included.

The Free Store, now relocated in the former LVPA Station, 523 US Route 20, is gaining traction. The Store is stocked with plenty of nice things from clothing for everyone, lots of winter coats and accessories, shoes, some kitchen items, children's books and baby items. Shoppers are encouraged to come and browse from 12 noon to 5PM on Wednesdays and 11 to 2 pm on Sundays, or whenever the Community Center is open. Clean donations can be dropped off during the Free Store's open hours (including Community Center hours) and the Town Hall during business hours. Please, NO large items and NO books other than children's books.

Speaking of small changes that can make a big difference, the Taskforce's collection of batteries and clean plastic film in ongoing. (Cartons for batteries are located in Town Hall, the Library, both Post Offices, and County Squire Hardware. and a bin for plastic film is in Town Hall). By making a small change in the way they dispose of these items, residents help reduce landfills and enable the recycling of valuable materials.
